

Amanda, the sweet talk between Landon and Bay is so very tiresome. In reality, there is a great deal of redundant dialogue just to fill the pages. The stories can be better without so much redundancy, just like in coding; redundancy is bad. Still though, I like the story line.

These are just plain fun. Now they might not be every bodies cup of tea as they are snarky. The Winchesters are a dysfunctional family of epic proportions and the fact that they are witches seems to up the volume on that considerably. I find them laugh out loud funny. It is obvious that Ms Lee writes these tongue in cheek. It is also apparent that she has given the whole concept quite a bit of thought. When you write a paranormal you have to be careful to define the boundaries of the world you have created or you will be constantly writing yourself into a corner. She has created a setting that is populated with quirky characters that are perfect foils for the Winchesters and their antics. If you are a fan of Jana DeLeon, Janet Evanovich, A.W. Hartoin, Raven Snow or Angie Fox you will get these books. These are PG reads but the humor as stated earlier is heavy on the snark. Which if you couldn't guess I like.

I really enjoy reading the WWoftheM series. Not a fan of the short novellas though (changing who is the first person is confusing and takes way from the story). This is another good witch mystery for the gang to solve. My only problem is that they didn't know what to do when I child starts seeing ghost. SERIOUSLY! That never happened before! To draw it out like that at the child's expenses was little off putting. This is why I only give 4 stars this time.

3 1/2 stars Let me start by saying that I've read every book in the Grimlock series, the Avery Shaw series and this Midwest Witches series. Plus I've read the first book in the Mystic Caravan series. Ms Lee is without a doubt one of my favorite authors. Now about this book, as usual, I loved all of the main characters & the story itself (I still smile when I think about Aunt Tillie's leggings). But I'm sorry to say that I had issues. Two issues to be exact - Belinda & Annie. Many if not all of you will probably disagree but IMO they just don't fit (and never did). I don't feel that they mesh at all with the Winchester clan. To me, their characters feel awkward and unbalance the story (disrupting the natural flow). I mean, this story is built around 7 single women who are all Winchester Witches. They're a quirky but very close & loving family. Now add in the 3 (occasional) fathers, the 3 future husbands (Landon, Marcus and Sam) and everyone's beloved (uncle-like) Chief Terry and we've got one big family. A family that makes sense. Bringing in yet another single woman (a stranger)

and her kid... felt like more of an intrusion to me. And then to (coincidentally) make the kid out to be another witch was just..... a bit much... and not needed IMO. It's hard to explain but the whole thing feels off. On top of that, I really didn't like either of their characters (especially) in this book. Maybe it's just me but that's how I feel. Sadly, the way the book ended makes me think that Ms Lee has already decided to add Belinda and Annie to the number of prominent main characters. If so, the story will lose much of it's charm (for me). And honestly, this series already has a large cast of main characters and I really don't want to give up precious book time to either Belinda or Annie. For now, I'll just keep my fingers crossed (continue reading) and hope that I'm wrong.

No one makes paranormal seem ordinary and yet extraordinary like Lee does. The Winchesters are endlessly entertaining in their family antics, the ghost story in this one is tight and so is the mystery. I confess that this time the identity of the arsonist caught me by surprise.

As usual, the character development overshadows the plot, which is just fine. This time, a lot of the development centers around Annie, the daughter of the woman the Winchesters took in. She can see ghosts, and the book is a balancing act between protecting her and telling her mother. The dramatic tension was good, but telling Belinda, Annie's mother, fell flat. I felt it was glossed over. Still, it was, as always, enjoyable.

This book, for me, was the LOL funniest book of this series. The other books were funny, but this one was without a doubt the funniest. Aunt Tilly was at her most hilarious by far. I recommend this series to everyone. But start from the beginning. You won't be sorry. ,
